
Our Parenting Place Sunday on April 7 invites you to engage in awareness and prevention of childhood trauma and the building of resilience.

Our community partners at The Parenting Place will be with us to help us better understand Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and how they shape the relationship-building and hopeful change that can occur through trauma-informed respite care, home visits, and education for parents, professionals and the greater community. We will learn more about the amazing work of Donation Warehouse, a source of support brought to life by Missoula Exchange Club members. We will be invited to a series of events throughout April and May documentaries, panel discussions, volunteer opportunities. Through it all, we can consider our own experiences with ACEs and resilience-building, and how that has and will continue to shape how we move in love of self and neighbor.

I'd encourage you to begin by listening to the 2014 TED talk of California's now Surgeon General, Dr. Nadine Burke Harris. ACEs research informed and dramatically altered her treatment of her young patients and additional wrap-around care. Her talk is entitled "How childhood trauma affects health across a lifetime;" you will find it at https://www.ted.com/talks.

Also, please mark your calendar for three screenings at the Roxy Theater – of Tre Maison Dasan, Resilience, and Paper Tigers – on April 11, May 12 and May 25, with each followed by a panel discussion. 

Sign up to be a part of the Maundy Thursday prayer vigil

Devote an hour or more to prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane with Jesus on the Thursday of Holy Week, April 18th. Starting immediately after the Maundy Thursday Service and continuing until the next morning, parishioners will sign up for an hour at a time to sit in the church and pray. Bring a journal, a book for reflection, or even an instrument, and sit with others (two people sign up for each 1-hour slot) as we "stay awake with Jesus."

Look for the sign up in the parish hall. Consider inviting a friend to join you in your shift. Those who have done this in previous years have found it to be a moving and spiritual time.

The church doors will be locked and opened when you knock on the door for your time.

Transitions in progress

In April our Church School changes a bit due to Easter. The first Sunday they will once again meet downstairs and then go upstairs for the second half of the service. This continues to be experimental as we learn from our experience and think and pray about how to nurture our children and inspire them towards growth in their faith and connection to church.

On Palm Sunday the children will participate in our annual procession and then go downstairs to finish out the story time and to participate in special Holy Week activities. We have no Church School program on Easter and

encourage families to worship together. Remember the nursery is always open. Please note Sunday April 28th is an atypical day for Church School. We will be filling power packs at the Missoula Foodbank starting at 9 a.m. Children will need to be dropped off there. We will arrange for transportation back to church around 11 a.m. This is a popular service project. There is a lot of hands-on work to be accomplished, and the time goes very quickly. It's a great opportunity for kids to practice, being God's hands in the world! More details on this later.

Guest Speaker Reverend Stacey Siebrasse will lead us in thinking about how we are greater together.

Stacey grew up in Havre and attended the University of Montana for college. Next, having gained a fervent curiosity about the world, she signed up to volunteer in Argentina through the Young Adults in Global Mission program, an extension of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Her year drew attention to harmful missional narratives and the intersection between global evangelism and justice, inspiring her to pursue a career in pastoral ministry. She went on to attend Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, CA

and was ordained into the ELCA in July of 2013. Stacey pastored a bilingual congregation in San Francisco before moving back to Montana.

Stacey currently serves as a liaison between her church synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Bolivia. Her travels and movement throughout a variety of contexts have impassioned her desire to bridge the people and culture of Montana to God's greater world. She's constantly inspired by global, ecumenical, and interfaith partnerships that share in story and mutual meaning-formation. She believes that, once connected, stories can generate the power needed to enact social change, communal health, and the wholeness of all of God's creation. For this reason and more, Stacey feels her new role as a Community Organizer for the Missoula Interfaith Collaborative is a great fit! She looks forward to working with Holy Spirit and MIC's entire broad base of institutions for the betterment of our local community and God's kingdom come!

Exploring prayer through word, art and movement

Plan to attend this day-long retreat on April 6th here at Holy Spirit. Whether you are new to prayer, or you're looking to refresh your prayer life, this is a fabulous opportunity for all men and women in our parish. Three sessions in the morning will highlight different formats for prayer. Jody Thomasson and Betsy Holmquist will focus on The Book of Common Prayer, pointing us to some of its treasures and helping us to use it as a tool for our own prayer life. Willie Hoffer and Rev. Gretchen Strohmaier will discuss visual arts as a means to prayer. Suzy Wiseheart and Valerie Hess will share about movement as a doorway to prayer.

The afternoon is hands-on. Participants will choose two of the three experiential sessions to attend. Each session is 90 minutes long.

- > Practice using the tools within The Book of Common Prayer.
- ➤ Learn how to create a soul collage. Or, practice responding to art as a means of prayer. All supplies will be provided. No art experience is necessary.
- ➤ In our time together, we will begin to explore ways that prayer can be more "embodied" through movement, like walking a labyrinth or holding yoga poses.

Born in Helena, Donnel moved back east as a child. He was ordained deacon at the National Cathedral and served parishes in the dioceses of Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Central New York.

He spent his first year after retirement with his wife Janet in Haiti, teaching English to nursing students and helping out in the local Episcopal congregation in Leogane. They relocated to Kalispell in 2016, and he began as rector of Christ Church that September.

Just back from travels in Haiti and Dominican Republic, Donnel will share from a perspective of communal worship on an international scale.

Allow Jesus to speak to you through the liturgies of Holy Week

Holy Week signals the culmination of our Lenten practices. We hope to enter it with ears to hear and eyes to see, perhaps in ways we haven't experienced before. Consider giving yourself extra down time during this week to fully integrate the twists and turns of this upending drama, allowing Jesus to speak to you.

We celebrate Palm Sunday,* the joyous palm-laden procession of Jesus into Jerusalem, on April 14th. As in past years, we will gather in the parish hall prior to the 10:15 a.m. service for the Liturgy of the Palms and then process into the church. (The 8 a.m. service will begin in the church as usual.) The choir will do a special procession around the nave, and the palms will be blessed in the chancel. This service requires us to make an abrupt shift from celebration to the darkness of crucifixion. At both services the Passion Gospel will be read

The Maundy Thursday* service happens on April 18th at 7 p.m. We will begin the evening with a soup supper in the parish hall at 6 p.m. A simple table Eucharist will be offered along with foot washing. This service offers an intimate experience of the Last Supper and powerful visual images pointing to Jesus' sacrifice. The altar is stripped at the end of the service, and the

congregation leaves in the dark.

The prayer vigil begins immediately after the Maundy Thursday service. The disciples slept while Jesus prayed and then they fled, leaving him all alone. And so, it is on this night that we stay awake. Parishioners sign up for one-hour increments to sit in the church, to watch and wait and pray.

Good Friday services are on April 19th at noon. On this day, we remember Jesus' death. The Passion Gospel will be read, this time from the Gospel of John, and there will be opportunity to venerate the cross.

The Easter Vigil* happens on Saturday, April 20th, starting at 7:30 p.m. and followed by an Easter reception. The service begins in the dark, symbolizing Jesus' dark tomb. The space is lit only by the paschal candle, *the light of Christ*. Hope builds incrementally within the service until Jesus' resurrection is recognized and celebrated.

Easter morning services celebrate that glorious resurrection with music, bells and flowers. Services will be offered at both 9 a.m.* and 11 a.m. Please join us!

*Childcare will be provided during these services.
