## Mary's Story: Advent Abundance

Imagine yourself as Mary. You are visited by an angel and told that you will bear the Son of God. You will give birth to the Messiah, the one who will change the world. You say, "yes" and enter into the divine plan. You may lose the respect of your family or the man you are betrothed to. One thing is certain, life as you know it has changed forever.

Throughout scripture, God chooses unlikely people to be a part of the holy narrative. Mary was young and unmarried. She was Jewish in a land under foreign leadership, and she was a woman. In her context, she is the definition of powerless. Yet, the Lord looks upon her with favor and calls her blessed.

Like Mary, we are called to be bearers of Christ. In a world crying out for justice and hungry for peace, we are called to be witnesses of God's love for all people. Saying, "yes," to God might bring us to surprising places. We might be transformed or we may even transform the world around us.

Often we tell ourselves that we are not quite ready to say, "yes," to God. I tell myself that I would be a better steward if only I made more money. A congregation might ... story continued on page 5




#### **Sunday Dinners**

Our Advent story dismisses these concerns. Mary had only herself to offer. That was all she needed. Using her own body, she gave life to a savior. God had fully equipped her to answer her call. God doesn't ask that we make ourselves better before following Jesus. Being wealthy, or influential, or strong in number will not make us better disciples. We are welcomed just as we are into the Body of Christ.

Mary's life is a story of abundance. We may at times feel powerless, but God doesn't see us that way. Child, student, parent, working, or retired, God empowers each of us to be God's hands and feet in the world. Mary teaches us that we can boldly say, "Yes." We already have everything we need to live our lives in response to God's love.
