

### The gifts reflected in a new pillow

Follow me on a Parenting Place journey of the many gifts reflected in a brand-new pillow...

It begins at Bed, Bath & Beyond (BB&B), a special corporate partner of the Parenting Place. Each week, a volunteer drives to BB&B to load up a donation of one, two, or maybe six or more boxes of surplus store items. The boxes are taken to a nearby storage unit lined with shelves to hold the bedding, kitchen and household supplies, and lots of pillows.

Parenting Place staff, assisted by volunteers, unpack and organize the items so they are ready for the next family in need who becomes a part of the Parenting Place family through respite, or a parenting class, or when partnered with a parent aide, or when referred by another family agency.

Today that family might be a mother and her two children who have just found housing but have little else to make it a home. At Donation Warehouse, they can afford to get started with a couple of beds, a couch, a small table. And from the BB&B bounty, mom picks out a new pillow. Tears well up, and she says it is the very first new pillow she has ever had.

From a generous BB&B partnership, through a cohort of loving volunteers, to a compassionate and competent Parenting Place staff, aided by the wonders of Donation Warehouse, a mom finds a community to rest in within her first-ever new

### Church School 2019:

# We're trying something new in Church School

A decade ago we heard from families that what they wanted when they came to church was an opportunity to worship quietly with other adults while their children participated in a separate Church School program. Church School teachers worked hard to create a learning environment that was authentic and honored the spiritual lives of our children, recognizing that children's worship was real. It wasn't just pretend or glorified baby-sitting.




Kids actively participated in all aspects of the service, and it was designed to meet the broad range of their developmental needs. It worked, resulting in rich child-centered worship opportunities. The kids were church for each other, sharing prayers of joy about everything from soccer to restored health, and prayers of intercession for things like a parent who lost a job, to family members facing serious illness and death. But the downside of this model was that it tended to create a separate worshiping community, resulting in two congregations, one of children and one of adults.

Over the last 8 months we hosted two parent summits here at Holy Spirit to learn about the changing dynamics of family life. We asked parents what they value for their children here at Holy

Spirit. We also conducted interviews with staff at different local churches in Missoula and within other Episcopal churches around the diocese. We learned that families' needs are changing. We learned that theories of Christian formation are changing too. We heard more about integrating kids into the life of the whole parish, rather than always separating them out. Though it has always been our practice to periodically include children in community-wide worship so they got a taste and feel for our Episcopal style, we'll be working more intentionally to integrate children into worship and into the life of our parish over the coming months.

We'll be experimenting and learning together what makes sense for our kids and families. Likely, you will see children beginning worship with you in the pew, leaving for a short while for a child-specific sermon, and then rejoining the larger congregation for Eucharist. Already we have started implementing more opportunities for kids to learn about service. This was a theme we learned has growing importance for families. In February and into the spring there will be handson opportunities for kids to practice service. Keep an eye out. You, the rest of our church family, will likely be invited to join us. Creating more intergenerational opportunities is also important according to our families and according to other families within Missoula and around the diocese. Trying something new, as we know, is not easy, but we look forward to learning and to a refreshed worship experience for us all as we do something new.

A new book study looks at poverty in American city life due to housing insecurity:

# **Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City**

Join Facilitators Carla Mettling and Kate Laney for this book study. It started the end of January but feel free to join the group in progress. Check with the church office about availability of the book (\$13). The group meets on Wednesday evenings in the Guild Room from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. and runs through February 27<sup>th</sup>.

We are often told to care for the poor, but who and where are they and why are they poor? Our culture tells us they are the lazy ones or the addicts or mentally ill. But the truth is that our system of laws, particularly those connected with housing, make people poor and keep them that way, ruining families and individuals along the way.

Following our parish's chosen ministry to children and families at risk,

Social Concerns Committee invites interested parishioners to read together *Evicted*, by Matthew Desmond, winner of the 2017 Pulitzer Prize in General Nonfiction. The book provides a ground-level view of some of the most urgent issues facing America today: poverty in American city life due to housing insecurity, economic exploitation, public policy, and racial inequality.

In *Evicted*, Princeton sociologist Desmond follows eight families in the poorest areas of Milwaukee as they struggle to keep a roof over their heads. Even in the most desolate areas of American cities, evictions used to be rare. But today, most poor renting families are spending more than half


Join us for Compline on February 3 at 8 p.m. in the church:

As we see families forced into shelters, squalid apartments, or more dangerous neighborhoods, we bear witness to the human cost of unjust laws and policies, and to people's determination and intelligence in the face of hardship. Its unforgettable scenes of hope and loss remind us of the centrality of home, without which everything else falls apart.

# Join us for a second letter writing workshop

Social Concerns Committee invites interested parishioners to a 2nd letter writing workshop to put together letters from HSP to our state legislators to protect Medicaid Expansion. HSP is partnering with Missoula Interfaith Collaborative and the Montana Association of Christians to advocate for those living at or below the poverty line who depend on Medicaid Expansion for health care and would be greatly endangered if the State Legislature does not make Medicaid Expansion permanent this year. It is urgent that we convince our elected representatives to keep Medicaid Expansion in place for our state's most vulnerable people.

The most effective way to support them is to tell their stories. Come join us after church on February 3, at 11:45 a.m. in the Guild Room, to put stories into letters to our legislators about people we know or have heard about who have depended on Medicaid Expansion to keep their lives together and seen that support threatened. We will learn ways to organize and present these stories effectively in letters. And telling them would not mean revealing the identities of those involved. Do ask your friends and acquaintances if they have such stories to share and please send these to Gretchen, so we can use them in our lobbying letters. Let's be a voice for the voiceless to those in power.

# Advocacy at Holy Spirit: supporting the most vulnerable

Holy Spirit's advocacy initiative stepped into high gear in January, as parishioners wrote letters to legislators and trekked to the capitol in Helena to make their concerns known about behavioral health funding and Medicaid Expansion.

Our parish's first advocacy effort has two goals: restoring full funding for case managers for the mentally ill and developmentally disabled and making sure that Medicaid Expansion continues in Montana.

Funding for case managers was slashed by the Legislature in 2017, resulting in hardships and dangerous conditions for clients. Montana Medicaid, which serves nearly 97,000 Montanans, is set to expire in mid-2019 unless the Legislature keeps it going.

At a workshop on January 13, parishioners collected stories about individuals severely affected by the case manager cuts and made them the centerpieces of letters to legislators on the Joint Health and Human Services Committee. And on January 21, parishioners from Holy Spirit and many other churches in Missoula were scheduled to travel to Helena for the annual legislative day organized by MAC, Montana Association of Christians.

Check out the advocacy bulletin board in the parish hall. It will remain there while the legislature is in session. Visit it to learn about the issues and to learn about ways you can get involved.

### Facts about blood donors

- One donation can save the lives of up to three people.
- The number one reason donors say they give blood is because they "want to help others."
- Two most common reasons cited by people who don't give blood are "Never thought about it" and "I don't like needles."
- Forty-five percent of people in the U.S. have type O (positive or negative) blood.

### What do I need to do to give blood?

#### **Q.:** Who can donate blood?

**A.:** The basic eligibility requirements are:

- Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds.
- You must be in general good health.
- Those under 18 are encouraged to donate, but a parent must sign a consent form.
- You must not have donated blood in the last 56 days (That means you have not donated blood since December 27<sup>th</sup>, but thanks anyway!).
- People who have traveled in certain foreign countries, have had hepatitis, HIV, or certain other conditions, take certain medications, or have had recent body art by needle must check with the American Red Cross Blood Services at 1-800-733-2767 or redcrossblood.org.

#### O.: What else do I need to know?

**A.:** Bring a picture ID or your Red Cross donor card with you.

- Be sure to eat a good meal and drink plenty of fruit juice or water before you donate. Beverages with caffeine are not a good choice.
- Wear clothing with short sleeves or with sleeves that can easily be raised above your elbow. We don't want anyone having to strip down to his or her skivvies!
- Plan to stay after donating for at least 15 minutes and enjoy a snack and a healthful drink in the hosting area to be sure you are okay.
