Shrove Tuesday, also known as Fat Tuesday or Mardi Gras, is coming soon on February 25. As a prelude to the Lenten season, it is an Anglican tradition to feast on eggs, butter, and sugar the day before the Lenten period. As always, the men of Holy Spirit will again celebrate this day by hosting a Pancake Supper for all parishioners and guests. Take a night off from shopping for groceries, planning a meal, cooking,

and cleaning up. We will serve **all you can eat** delicious pancakes and sausages, accompanied by syrup, coffee, juice, and milk. The cost is \$5 for adults, \$4 for children 5-12, and free for anyone 4 and under.

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Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26

Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, derives its name from the ancient practice of marking the foreheads of worshippers with ashes from the unused palm branches of the previous year. As the service for Ash Wednesday says:

Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

Join us on Ash Wednesday, February 26, as we begin our Lenten journey to Easter. We will have Holy Eucharist with the Imposition of Ashes at 12 noon and at 7 p.m. that day.

It can be a cue to understand our rightful place in the world. It underscores the importance of humility, but I think it can also call us to reconsider our connection to the natural world. In February we have two other opportunities to consider our connection to this earth:

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Deepen your experience of God with Centering Prayer

Centering Prayer is offered twice a month at Holy Spirit by Willie Hoffer and Jennifer Dousset. Centering Prayer is a meditation process that invites us to enter an inner sacred space to quiet our minds, open our hearts, and take rest in the Love of God. You will be gently led into the silence. Celebrate the Light of Epiphany in the quiet of Compline

Now, as we see the lights of evening, we raise our voice in hymns of praise; worthy are you of endless blessing, Sun of our night, Lamp of our days. (from Phos hilaron*)

*Phos hilaron ("O Gracious Light") is known as the "Lamp-lighting hymn". It dates from the early 4th century and is the earliest known Christian hymn (recorded outside of the Bible) still in use today.

Please join us in celebrating the light of Christ in the candlelight of Compline on Sunday, February 2, the fourth Sunday after Epiphany at 8 p.m. The service meditations will center on litanies of Epiphany and of the night. The choir will begin the service with a setting of Phos hilaron and chant the 84th Psalm ("How dear to me is your dwelling place").

Race & Faith: respecting the dignity of every human being

Beginning on Wednesday, March 4, join us on the five Wednesday evenings of Lent to hear speakers share their thoughts on topics such as the history of racism, privilege, and reparations. We'll end the series with a final session focused on practical communication skills, giving us tools to discuss race with friends, family, and acquaintances. U of M history professor and Director of African-

American Studies Tobin Miller Shearer will lead off our series, speaking on both March 4th (about history of racism) and March 11th (about privilege). Judith Heilman, Executive Director of the Bozeman-based Montana Racial Equity Project, will speak about reparations on March 18th. A word about Lenten Potlucks this year

After thoughtful consideration and discussion, we've decided to reformat our Lenten programs. **The Lenten series will not include a potluck meal this year.** Please do give us feedback about this change as we are open to reinstating the potlucks next year, based on what we hear from you. This

year we encourage you to eat at home and then join us for the evening educational presentation at 7:00 p.m. in the nave. The program will run until 8:15, and we'll close with a brief Compline service. Childcare will be available.

Holy Spirit's blood drawing takes place on February 24, 1 pm-6 pm

The church's next blood drawing with the American Red Cross takes place on Monday, February 24th, this year, and donors are always needed. Although blood products can be used in a variety of ways, whole fresh blood is required for some life-saving procedures such as transfusions.

We have always met our goal of registering parishioners and friends for all 21 available slots. Over the past 20 years, we have donated about 300 units of whole blood. Let's keep that great tradition going!

For a successful blood drive, three or more volunteers are needed for 1-2 hour shifts between 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. on

February 24 to register donors and to host the recovery and refreshments table. We would also appreciate a few donations of baked goods or a cheese and cracker plate for the donors.

To register or to volunteer to assist with the drawing, please contact Anita Rognas, coordinator, at 208-305-4022 or at anita.rognas@gmail.com. There will also be sign-up sheets at the church door after the 10:15 a.m. services and at coffee hour for several weeks before the blood drawing. You may also contact the church office at 542-2167 to register to be a blood donor.

What do I need to do to give blood?

Q.: Who can donate blood?

A.: The basic eligibility requirements are:

- Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds.
- You must be in general good health.
- Those under 18 are encouraged to donate, but a parent must sign a consent form.
- You must not have donated blood in the last 56 days (That means you have not donated blood since December 29th, but thanks anyway!).
- People who have traveled in certain foreign countries, have had hepatitis, HIV, or certain other conditions, take certain medications, or have had recent body art by needle must check with the American Red Cross Blood Services at 1-800-733-2767 or redcrossblood.org.

Q.: What else do I need to know?

A.: Bring a picture ID or your Red Cross donor card with you.

- Be sure to eat a good meal and drink plenty of fruit juice or water before you donate. Beverages with caffeine are not a good choice.
- Wear clothing with short sleeves or with sleeves that can easily be raised above your elbow. We don't want anyone having to strip down to his or her skivvies!
- Plan to stay after donating for at least 15 minutes and enjoy a snack and a healthful drink in the hosting area to be sure you are okay.
