Vestry approves new advocacy policy


The Episcopal Church has a long history of engaging in advocacy work. We need only look to the recent General Convention for examples. Resolutions were passed calling on congregations to advocate for immigrants, to work towards racial reconciliation, and to respond to the opioid epidemic (to name a few). Our baptismal covenant calls us "to respect the dignity of every human being" (Book of Common Prayer, p. 305). It is not uncommon that as we work to put action behind these words, we find ourselves being called to advocate on behalf of others.

But how do we engage in this as a body? The Vestry, with much thought, prayer, congregational input, and deliberation, has adopted an advocacy policy. The intention is that this policy will provide a process for the parish to engage in congregation-wide advocacy work. The immediate goal is to engage the parish in one issue of importance and community-wide relevance and to work together towards change in our community and/or state.

Read the policy on our website (www.holyspiritmissoula.org and see the Outreach tab) and review the advocacy example there as well.

It's time to try this out. The only way we'll learn is by moving forward. We invite you to participate in the five-session series, *Practicing Advocacy with Civility* this fall as together we continue to learn and grow as the body of Christ.

The Wider Church:

79th General Convention approves many different legislative actions

The 79th General Convention of The Episcopal Church met for its triennial convention from July 5 to 13 in Austin, Texas, continuing a tradition begun in the late eighteenth century. Meeting every three years, the convention consists of a bicameral legislature that includes the House of Deputies, i.e., four members of the laity and four clergy elected from each diocese, and the House of Bishops, representing each diocese. At this convention the House of Deputies was composed of 843 members from 110 dioceses, not only in the United States but including those in Central America, South America, the Caribbean, the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, and Taiwan, in addition to the official youth presence. During the three-year interim between General Conventions various committees, agencies, boards and task forces created by the General Convention are charged with the implementation of the convention's approved decisions and resolutions.

Major legislative actions from this year's convention include:

- Agreement to give full access to the trial use of marriage rites, thus allowing same-sex couples to be married by their priests in their home churches;
- Agreement to develop a plan for liturgical and prayer book revision;
- Approval for use of an expansion-language version of Rite II Eucharist prayers;
- Admission of the church in Cuba as a diocese:
- Commitment to racial reconciliation and becoming a "Beloved Community;"
- Responses to the voices and stories of women;
- Statements against the humanitarian crisis in Israel-Palestine, but not full divestment.

What: Bring a yoga mat (or towel), and a blanket. Dress comfortably.



The Montana Faith and Environment Coalition (MFEC) will be hosting the first annual Faith, Science & Climate Action Conference in Bozeman, October 12 and 13, 2018. The conference is to facilitate discussion between Montana faith leaders and scientists to address climate change.
